I am reading an excellent book “The Book of Joy” ; His Holiness the Dali Lama and Archbishop Desmond Tutu in conversation with Douglas Abrams. Early in the book there are some most helpful thoughts. Desmond Tutu starts by saying “we are fragile creatures, and it is from this weakness, we discover the possibility of true joy, Life is filled with challenges and adversity... .. fear is inevitable as is pain and eventually death”. All the more poignant now that his prostate cancer has returned.

The questions also point to the fragility of life that Desmond Tutu mentions. Life can be very complicated and frightening if we try to face these questions alone. The joy of the book for me is that two spiritual leaders of different faiths explore some of the issues that affect our joy or happiness together.

Some would have you believe that the Christian faith is all serious and not a lot of fun. Well that may have been the case once but today we talk about enjoying our services and the worship of God. We hope that people who come in contact with us in church or anywhere will find that we are full of joy.

This is not a fool’s paradise; rather, it is the balance of our lives that matters. We are joyful because we are loved by God in the difficulties that surround us. We find joy when we find God and when we accept his love for us. Whilst thinking about Joy I have been very heartened by the response of so many of you to our request for donations to help cover the cost of this magazine. Thank you for your donations they totalled approx. £250 to date.

New Year Message from the Bishop of St Albans

For many people 2016 was difficult and challenging. The refugees fleeing the civil war in Syria have had a harrowing time and many died. In Yemen, the ‘forgotten famine’ has left seven million people near to starvation. Here in Britain, in the aftermath of the Brexit vote, there was a depressing rise in hate crime and racial attacks. These were often directed at people in our own society as well as outsiders, such as the refugees for whom only a year ago we voiced such compassion. In 2016, foodbank use in Britain remained at record levels. Around 3.7 million children in the UK are reckoned to be living in poverty. The number of homeless people has risen three years in a row.



Does 2017 have to be the same or can we make a difference? There are encouraging signs.

Over Christmas people in Hertfordshire and Bedfordshire people helped to alleviate hunger. Two and a half tons of food and gifts were collected by Watford churches to distribute at the local foodbank. There are similar foodbanks in Tring, Bishops Stortford, Stevenage, Bedford, Leighton Buzzard and many other places. There were also countless parties for people who live alone and had no one to share Christmas with. Many individuals invited lone neighbours to a meal over the festive season.

Groups of people, often based in churches, have been collecting and distributing aid both to the small number of refugees we’ve welcomed into our midst and for the refugee camps in Syria and Lebanon. Very often they did this in the name of Jesus ‘the one in whom all our hungers are satisfied’.

The New Year is traditionally the time when we make resolutions. It’s tempting to make them for our private lives, a sort of personal manifesto to make my life or my family’s life better. But how about having at least one resolution which is about making the world a better place? This might be about engaging with a local or international charity or doing something practical of a neighbour. Such decisions can make the world a better place, especially if we all do it.

An introduction to the geology of Sherrardspark Wood.

This is the first of four articles that look at the writers behind the four gospels in the New Testament. There may be later articles on other books or letters contained in the Bible. The reason I start with the Gospels is because they record the life, works and words of Jesus, the word Gospel means glad tidings, and in Christian thought this concerns salvation and the kingdom of God as announced to the world by Christ. So really the word gospel best thought of as meaning good news.

Part 1 – The Gospel According to St Mark

We are all taught that the order of the gospels is Matthew, Mark, Luke and John as that is the order they appear in the Bible. However, the first of the four gospels to be written was the Gospel according to St Mark. It was probably written between AD 60 and 70, about thirty years after the death and resurrection of Jesus. This would still have been in living memory but any remaining disciples would have been considered elderly. Mark's gospel was not however the earliest surviving writing of the New Testament to be written, that honour goes to Paul's letters. Paul wrote his letters as instruction, guidance and sometimes reproof to the churches he founded, most if not all of these were written before the Gospels were compiled.

We know very little about the author of the Gospel of Mark but it is likely that he was known to the Apostle Paul. What is very clear is that he was very well connected in the early church and understood it situation very well.

Before Mark wrote his gospel, stories about Jesus circulated in the early church both in writing and of course orally. The main source of the letters, histories and stories of Christ would naturally have been the disciples. The reason Mark decided to bring these together into a gospel was, probably, the inevitable deaths of the original twelve disciples, in many cases through martyrdom. Mark took their accounts of events and wove them together into his gospel.

Mark's gospel is not at all long nor is it unnecessarily wordy or complicated, it could be read in one sitting in as little as two hours. It is not ordered as the life of Jesus would have been.

It has little in the way of chronology except for the last week of Jesus' life, to which Mark devotes a quarter of his gospel. A little like those blankets made of knitted squares all different colours or patterns, Mark assembled them in the way he felt they would go together best, acting both as an editor and writer.

It starts with Jesus being baptised by John the Baptist and ends in chapter 16 verse 8 with the women fleeing from the empty tomb. The rest of the chapter is in all probability an addition to the gospel, written by someone at a much later date. Theologians are divided in their opinions



as to whether Mark originally finished his gospel on such an a shockingly dramatic and sudden note.

Some think Mark's original ending was lost, others that he died before he could complete it while still others feel that was the way Mark intended to end it, leaving the reader to draw the conclusion, through faith, that Jesus had been raised from the dead. I would be fascinated to hear your opinion. For what its worth I am uncertain but somehow love the idea of it ending on the drama of the women running from the tomb and us being left looking in. Looking in with wonder and awe.

Mark wrote the first Gospel and in doing so changed history because the stories of Christ were preserved by the whole Christian community. Indeed, as we shall see, his gospel acted as a template, particularly for the writers of Matthew and Luke who copied great chunks of Mark's gospel into their own writings but John as we shall see in due course is written in a very different way.



Jeremy, who died aged 85 on the 14th December last year, and whose funeral took place at St Johns on 23rd December, is remembered with great fondness by the Lemsford Local History Group.

He joined the Group at its inception in 2001 when the Revd. Ron Ingamells became our Chairman. The following year Jeremy generously took over this role. As he had lived in the parish for many years, had spent some of his childhood in Parkway WGC and was used to dealing with people, he was the ideal person and steered us gently through the early years until his resignation as Chairman in 2007. He was particularly interested in the history of Cromer Hyde and was the author of our booklet 'Jeremy's Walk through Cromer Hyde' which is still in print.



At his funeral at St John's we learnt more of his 40 year illustrious career as a film and television director. His father was also a film director who had worked at Welwyn Film Studios. Jeremy started as a runner at Elstree studios and went on to direct films starring many well known actors, such as Tony Hancock, Roger Moore and Barbara Windsor. During the 80s he greatly enjoyed working for the BBC directing Tenko and Howard's Way. He later directed episodes of several familiar TV soaps such as - Coronation Street, Emmerdale and Brookside. Occasionally he could be persuaded to regale us with hilarious stories of his experiences.

We shall miss him.

I was quite overwhelmed by the presentation and kind words made to me on Sunday 8th January and should like to say a big thank you to everyone at St John's Church.

When I took over from Jane Mackay quite a long time ago flowers were arranged weekly either side of the Altar, behind the pulpit as well as the main pedestal. We were then averaging twenty five weddings a year as other venues were not yet registered. Quite often in summer there were two or three on the same day. To suit the various colours of bridesmaids dresses we always kept to a theme of green, cream and white flowers.

It was always a joy to have Gwil Walker practising the organ whilst I was doing the flowers. Dennis van Meijden our curate was often in Church always praising the Dutch cut flowers I was using and chatting about the different flowers.

Once when I was walking around the corner of the Church my arms full of flowers I had a fright when an armed policeman leapt out from behind a gravestone. Unknown to me there was a high powered conference at Brocket Hall and there was security everywhere.

The flower festival held on a very hot weekend in May 2009 was very special. Without the help of Janet English and Kevin Earl and Mike at home as organisers it would not have happened. Also vital were our flower arrangers, as well as all the volunteers who helped condition the flowers, make the teas, coffee and cakes. We had the encouragement of Edward all the way and it was absolutely wonderful how all the congregation came together that weekend. I remember we had to reprint programmes for all the many visitors and St. John's looked magnificent. No flowers would be found in Church without our volunteer arrangers and I owe them a big debt of gratitude. We have gradually reduced in number through people moving away or retiring, it would be lovely to have more. We have lots of laughs and it is a very relaxing hobby. We are lucky to have such a wide variety of flowers in our shops and we give flowers in times of sorrow and happiness with love. It is with love that we arrange flowers in St Johns.
